4	to order. This is a meeting of the U.S. Commission
5	on Civil Rights. It is currently 9:32 a.m. on
6	November 15th, 2013. Our meeting is taking place at
7	our headquarters, 1331 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W. in
8	Washington, D.C.
9	I'm Chairman, Marty Castro. The
10	Commissioners who are present at the meeting with me
11	are Vice Chair Thernstrom, Commissioner Gaziano,
12	Commissioner Heriot, Commissioner Achtenberg,
13	Commissioner Yaki, Commissioner Kirsanow, and
14	Commissioner Kladney.
15	A quorum of the Commission is present.
16	Is the court reporter present?
17	COURT REPORTER: Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Is the Staff Director
19	present?
20	DIRECTOR SALLO: Yes.
21	I. APPROVAL OF AGENDA
22	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. So, the first
23	item is that I move the agenda be approved. Is there
24	a second?
25	(Moved and seconded.)
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1	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Are there any
2	amendments?
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Mr. Chairman, I'd
4	like to
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: You have to turn your
6	mic on.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Sorry about that.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: I'm going to give you
9	an opportunity speak. We don't need to amend the
10	agenda for that.
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No? Okay. But I
12	move to amend the agenda as follows, move the
13	following Program Planning I'm sorry. Move the

2	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Any opposed? Any
3	abstention? Okay. So, the mic went off. How's that?
4	It's supposed to be constantly on, no? Okay.
5	So, before we actually get into the
б	formal agenda there's a couple of things I'd like to
7	say and to allow others to say. First of all, I'm
8	really pleased you've been hearing these pings, a
9	number of pings going on on our phone call with
10	folks who can listen in on our meeting via
11	telephone. And most of those folks, about 26 or 27
12	of them are members of our State Advisory
13	Committees, so I want to commend the Staff Director
14	and the Regional Directors for insuring that our SAC
15	members know the time, and the date, and the way to
16	call in on these meetings so they can listen in and
17	hear what we're doing, and participate via at least
18	telephone. Although they don't have the ability to
19	interact with us, they do have the ability to hear
20	firsthand what's going on, so I think that's a
21	welcome move in the right direction for further
22	engagement with our SACs. So, for those SAC members
23	on the phone I just want to, on behalf of the
24	Commission thank you all for your continuing service
25	and for being on the call with us today.
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1 Some of you know, the next topic, that 2 each Commissioner has a term of six years. Some 3 Commissioners serve again after reappointment, but 4 this year we have several of our Commissioners whose 5 terms are expiring at various times in December. So, 6 for some of our Commissioners this will be their 7 last meeting. I know it will be a last meeting for our Vice Chair, and possibly Commissioner Heriot and 8 Commissioner Kirsanow. Commissioner 9 Gaziano, his expire until after our 10 term does not December 11 meeting so presumably he'll join us then.

So, having said that, I want to afford the opportunity to some of our colleagues to say a few words and I'll start with our Vice Chair. Madam Vice Chair, you have the floor.

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Thank you verymuch, Mr. Chairman.

Well, it's hard for me to believe that I've been on the Commission since January 2001, and some would say she's been there too long, and I would agree. It is time for me, with some regret, to leave. I've grown old in the years I've been on the Commission, and I sometimes think maybe I can blame the Commission for that, but I think not.

I want to say a few words about my

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1	colleagues. First, I want to thank Marty Castro for
2	his graciousness towards me even though, of course,
3	we disagree politically. But he has been very
4	gracious, and I've been very appreciative of that.
5	I've had disagreements across the aisle
6	with most members of the Commission, but I leave
7	with high respect for everyone here. And I look
8	forward to the work, the important work that the
9	Commission will be doing in the coming months and
10	years. And I will certainly follow it with great
11	interest.
12	And, finally, I need to thank Tim Fay
13	who has been indispensable to me. He's a friend by
14	now, but he is also someone I have the highest
15	regard for intellectually. Frankly, if I could get
16	him on the occasion as a Commissioner I would do so
17	believing he belongs on it. But I've been completely
18	dependent on his wisdom, his good humor, his
19	friendship. And I think not only I, but the
20	Commission as a whole has greatly benefitted from
21	his presence.
22	I have spent my professional life around
23	very smart people, in general, but Tim ranks among
24	those I've known, ranks high up on the list. So, the
25	thing I will perhaps miss the most is my
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relationship with Tim.

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2 with that Ι bid farewell. And I'm 3 slightly physically under the weather so I don't 4 know how long I will stay at the meeting, but I will 5 stay as long as I can. And, again, thanks to 6 everybody for being colleagues for whom I have the 7 utmost respect.

8 CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Thank you, Madam Vice 9 Chair. Before I respond, I want to know if any of 10 the Commissioners would like to say a few words so 11 we could allow that time, as well.

12 COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Thanks, Mr. Chairman. I came on the Commission just a few months 13 14 after Abby did, and had the pleasure of working 15 together with her and valued her friendship and her and taught me a great deal about civil 16 wisdom, 17 rights, in general. Of course, she is a national 18 scholar of the first order. She has written perhaps 19 some, if not the definitive texts with respect to Voting Rights and, of course, the iconic "American 20 21 Black and White," along with Steven, so it's been my 22 privilege to serve with her.

It's been my privilege to serve with everybody on this Commission and all those that I've served with in the past despite our sometimes

б	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Pete, thank you
7	very much. And I was trying to figure out last night
8	how long the two of us have been together, but
9	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yes, nearly 12
10	years.
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, but I feel
12	the same about you. It's been a great privilege, and
13	you're a very special person. And I feel I hope
14	we won't lose touch.
15	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Heriot.
16	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I don't do goodbyes
17	all that well, but it has been very much a pleasure
18	serving on the Commission. I've enjoyed everyone
19	that I've worked with. I think we've turned out some
20	good work, and I know that the Commission will
21	continue to turn out good work. And thanks to
22	everyone.
23	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I thought people's
24	terms were expiring after mine, so I'm not prepared,
25	but I'll have to so very uncharacteristically
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1	very uncharacter, but I will be missing some
2	Commissioners at a minimum. Two of us may possibly
3	be among those who are reappointed, but I didn't
4	realize this would be the last meeting. Maybe I will
5	try to collect some thoughts and mention them, but I
6	do want to thank everyone, and thank particularly
7	those who are cycling off. Uncharacteristically said
8	I'll be brief, but I can say to all of you, I kind
9	of knew from the first few months before many of you
10	joined us that it would be a great challenge and
11	learning experience. And I have another professional
12	I made a comment to one or two of you. It's good
13	to learn new subject areas, new skills, but I think
14	what I have valued the most is the attention and
15	difficulty in serving in a collegial way, on a
16	collegial body where you disagree. And we had some
17	rough periods, particularly as new people cycle on
18	and off the Commission. But I'm pleased that we were
19	able to kind of figure each other out, figure out
20	how to do the business of the Commission. But I also
21	I will try to maybe collect my thoughts a little
22	better.
23	I wanted to thank our excellent staff
24	and, of course, I can praise John Martin, and I
25	should praise John Martin individually, but I want
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to thank all of the Commission's Special Assistants
and the professional staff, as well, for making the
Commission run.

CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Well, Madam Vice Chair, 4 5 I want to thank you and echo your comments about me back to you. It's been a gracious partnership. Being 6 7 Chair is a difficult job, but having you as my Vice Chair has made it easier. While we are of different 8 political philosophies, I think we clearly share the 9 love of this Commission and its mission, and on many 10 11 occasion it was that joint mission that allowed us 12 to overcome many challenges that were facing us and resolve them in a way that allowed bipartisanship to 13 14 actually happen here at the Commission while down 15 the road a bit it wasn't happening. And I appreciate that. 16

3	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Thank you. Commissioner
4	Kirsanow, I knew at our first meeting that we were
5	kindred spirits when you kept referring to yourself
6	as Klingon, and as a Star Trek and sci-fi fan.

8	resemble one.
9	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: I didn't want to say

22	not agree on the issues, I would always work to make
23	sure that we could work in a professional manner to
24	address all the issues that everyone wanted
25	addressed. And I think we did that, and it was in
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2	provided in your caucus on that, and I appreciate
3	it.
4	Commissioner Heriot, we've come to work
5	very closely together over the last three years. You
6	have been a point person for me in understanding the
7	needs of your caucus as we try to figure out how we
8	can move important topics forward. You have also
9	been I consider you a friend. You are concerned
10	about issues beyond just the issue at hand on
11	everything from whether I have the right kind of
12	office.
13	(Laughter.)
14	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I still think you
15	need a window office.
16	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: So, you've been very
17	thoughtful to me, and I know that when there are
18	times when we are having difficulty reaching a
19	consensus, I know that I can always go to you and we
20	can thoughtfully consider how to move forward. So, I
21	hope that you come back, but I know at this point we
22	don't know whether you all are going to be back with
23	us. But if this is indeed farewell, it's only a
24	brief farewell because we hope to stay in touch.
25	Todd, I know I get a chance to say
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1	goodbye probably in December, but I just want to
2	tell you now that it's been fun working with you. I
3	know we've talked about a lot of issues behind
4	closed doors, and I know that while publicly we may
5	be apart on a lot issues, I think when we're behind
6	closed doors there's a lot more commonality than
7	folks realized, and I know that you work very hard
8	to insure that your point of view is presented, and
9	by the same token, at least in your interactions
10	with me, you've been very gracious, and thoughtful,
11	and professional. And I've enjoyed hearing your
12	stories and I hope to continue to hear them beyond
13	your service here on the Commission.
14	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Thank you, Mr.
15	Chairman.
16	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: So, I don't know if any
17	other Commissioners want to chime in. Commissioner
18	Yaki?
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Thank you very much,
20	Mr. Chair. And having served the longest with some
21	of the folks who are cycling off, I wanted to say a
22	few words. One, for Abby who I've considered over
23	these past 8 years a dear friend. We do fight like
24	cats and dogs on a lot of issues, but we can always
25	at the end of the day laugh about it, and talk about
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1	things of commonality. We both know we care about
2	these issues. Sometimes you care about them in
3	different ways, but it doesn't mean that we don't
4	come from a good heart. And as an individual, I've
5	never met someone who is as intellectually deep and
6	as personally warm as Commissioner Thernstrom, so I
7	want to thank you for your friendship over the
8	years.
9	Commissioner Kirsanow and I have had
10	some well documented battles over the years, mainly
11	because we're both well, I mean, he's a on
12	Klingon so and I'm a Federation guy. It just
13	doesn't work out sometimes.
14	(Laughter.)
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: But I've always
16	admired his professionalism, his I'll never
17	forget the time that he would come to the Commission
18	with these binders on Supreme Court nominees that
19	were about 5,000 pages long and he's start leafing
20	through them and talking about well, I think
21	amazing. And there's a great depth and warmth there,
22	as well, that sometimes we don't see, but I see it
23	even when we're busy trying to punch each other. So,
24	in your native language I would say majQa' which
25	means well done in Klingon. And thank you for
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everything.

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And for Todd and Gail, I'm going to reserve comments because you could be back. 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1	II. PROGRAM PLANNING UPDATES
2	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: So, the first item on
3	the agenda actually, we have two reports from
4	our General Counsel's office. The first is from
5	Yasmin Elhady who's going to talk to us about the
6	annual giving. It's hard to believe it's that time
7	of year already. It seems like it was just a couple
8	of months ago.
9	MS. ELHADY: Good morning, Commissioners.
10	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Good morning.
11	MS. ELHADY: Always lovely to see all of
12	you, full house, incredible.
13	I would like to present to you the idea
14	of CFC and the giving campaign, again. This year
15	marks a very important year because the entire CFC
16	NCA program has raised over \$60 million last year,
17	one of its highest numbers ever. And this year marks
18	an important year because so many people could be
19	cycling off, so we want to make sure that if you
20	have the opportunity to give, that you give now,
21	hopefully, before you go.
22	This is a very important time of the
23	year, as well. A lot of people really are in need.
24	Our deadline this year will be actually extended to
25	January 15th of 2014, so you can give until January
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2	You have over 4,000 charities to choose
3	from. What's wonderful is that your dollars, your
4	funding helps really make the impossible possible.
5	You make it possible. That's the theme of this year,
6	and we hope that each of you will go to CFCNCA.org
7	and check out the charities for yourself. You can
8	also come to my office or to Barbara De La Viez'
9	office and get a paper catalogue with a listing of
10	all of the charities, if you prefer paper. I also
11	have paper pledge forms for anyone who would like to
12	pledge in paper. Of course, you can go online, as
13	well.
14	I'm happy to answer any of your
15	questions now or offline, since I know you have a
16	meeting to get along with. And I appreciate your
17	time. I hope that you give.
18	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: I'm sorry, I do have a
19	quick question.
20	MS. ELHADY: Yes?
21	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: So, I'm on the Board of
22	the Chicago Community Trust and they will match
23	certain gifts, so how is there some process in
24	there for that?

17	III. OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL
18	ETHICS TRAINING
19	MS. HEPLER: I have some signature sheets
20	in here.
21	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay.
22	MS. HEPLER: And these are a little
23	different
24	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Excuse me,
25	Jennifer. Excuse me, you all. We have people on the
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1	telephone, and if you don't use your microphones
2	they will not be able to hear you.
3	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay, thank you.
4	MS. HEPLER: Okay. I'm going to pass out
5	some sheets. I want you to sign them to show you're
б	here today. But also I have email addresses and
7	phone numbers for the departing people. And for the
8	people who are staying here, I still would like your
9	personal email address when I have questions to
10	direct to you, and if you're not here. So, I'm going
11	to pass them around. If your email address or your
12	phone number that's listed is wrong, please correct
13	it while you're looking at it. Thank you.
14	Okay, good morning. This may be the last
15	time I address some of you, and you're probably
16	clapping up and down with joy. And for others,
17	you'll be hearing more ethics in the future.
18	Today's topic is Expiration of
19	Appointments and Applicable Ethics Rules for
20	departing Commissioners and Special Assistants. And
21	for those who are staying, there's some information,
22	too. So, this will count towards your annual ethics
23	training requirement, and this is the last training
24	for 2013.
25	The agenda is we're going to talk about
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1	ethics authorities, and then expiration of terms,
2	financial disclosure requirements. Yes, you have to
3	file another one even if you're leaving. Seeking
4	employment, and post-employment, and other topics.
5	Okay. And the first one, and I'm going
6	to send this to all of you, is the ethics
7	authorities and links. And we're undergoing an
8	Office of Government Ethics Review, and they want
9	people to have access to all the ethics rules and
10	laws, so in the future I'm including this slide, as
11	well as this one. So, if you want the exact
12	provisions you can find them, or come to me.
13	Seeking ethics advice. And I want to
14	explain the Safe Harbor provisions, and this is for
15	current people are staying and leaving. If you
16	come to see me before you take action and I give
17	advice, even though it may be wrong, I try, but then
18	you will not be administratively liable. And that's
19	why I say come to me and talk before you do it. If
20	you disclose all the facts and I give you advice,
21	even if I do something wrong, you don't have to
22	worry, unless it's criminal. Now, there was a case
23	at DOI where they went to the ethics person, did not
24	tell all the facts, got an okay, and then it turned
25	out it was criminal, and they used the ethic
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1	officer's advice against the person because he did
2	not disclose all. Okay, go to the next one. That's
3	Department of Interior.
4	And I always remain a representative of
5	the federal government. That's what I want you to
6	know. There is no attorney/client privilege as came
7	out in that case definitely. And there's no Safe
8	Harbor for criminal provisions. I mean, I'm not
9	going to tell you to steal and it's okay, let's be
10	honest. Okay?
11	And now we're going to the big topic,
12	expiration of Commissioner terms. And, as you know,
13	four of you Presidential, four of you Congressional.
14	And there's and I want to say first that I had
15	two of my interns help with this presentation, and
16	one is here, Reziya Brumfield, and the other one is
17	Kristin Stitcher, and she has a paid internship on
18	Friday, so she's not here, but they helped me with
19	this.
20	No more than four from one political
21	party, and you know they're six-year terms, and you
22	can only be removed for neglect of duty. And,
23	obviously, a felony. Okay.
24	And there is a case on this
25	interpretation, United States v. Wilson. And the
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1	court was that you? That was you?
2	UNIDENTIFIED: No, I'm not Wilson.
3	MS. HEPLER: Okay. Know you're not
4	Wilson. Okay.
5	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: He was a party.
б	MS. HEPLER: He was a okay.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It was memorable.
8	MS. HEPLER: It was memorable.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The litigation,
10	yes.
11	MS. HEPLER: Oh, okay. Well, you've been
12	there. And it creates the statute creates fixed
13	six-year terms of office that run with the calendar
14	instead of the person in order to preserve staggered
15	six-year terms. And there's the cite. And,
16	obviously, some of us are very familiar with the
17	case then. Okay.
18	And, also, the court held that the
19	calculation of the fixed term is anchored by the
20	term of each member of the Commission and the
21	initial membership. For example, if someone only
22	served if they were appointed the first time and
23	then it goes on from that day, and if someone serves
24	a partial term then the next Commissioner gets the
25	rest of that term. And I think Commissioner
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2	started your term and your coming in. You can to
3	that end of that term.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And when I
5	arrived I was finishing somebody's term.
6	MS. HEPLER: You did that also. Okay,
7	where you finished and it ends on a fixed date, and
8	we'll go to that the next slide.
9	These are the dates for each one's term
10	ending, and it is based on the prior one up there,
11	the person who had it. So, your term is with your
12	end date there. And four are this year, and four are
13	in 2016. Okay?
14	And the next question
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I was the last
16	holdout in 2016. I just want
17	MS. HEPLER: What? Okay. The expiration
18	of the Special Assistant's terms, because each of
19	you has a Special Assistant. And each of you hold
20	what's called a Schedule C appointment, and you work
21	directly for a Presidential or Congressional
22	appointee. You have a confidential or
23	policy-determining relationship with your
24	supervisor, who is the Commissioner. And you have a
25	confidential relationship that implies knowledge and
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2	of the supervisor. And that's all the Special
3	Assistants. Okay.
4	And the rules are when a supervisor
5	leaves, then the confidential Schedule C
б	relationship ends, so either the Special Assistant
7	would resign, or the agency can involuntary separate
8	the Schedule C at the same time, or soon thereafter.
9	And this is from the Guide to Schedule C positions,
10	and if you have any questions go to HR, because this
11	is their area. Okay?
12	Now, as I said before, you still have to
13	file that financial disclosure form when you're
14	leaving. And you have to file a termination one, and
15	if you do it on line, I will send I'm going to
16	send you, if you let me know if you want it in paper
17	or not, I will send you the form, the right form.
18	You have to file on or before the 30th
19	day after you leave government service, and you can
20	get a 45-day filing extension again. Okay. Must pay
21	a \$200 late filing fee for any form that is filed
22	more than 30 days late. And it isn't on there, I had
23	something also, if you fail to file, it's
24	referred to Department of Justice, and you owe up to
25	\$50,000, so if you are thinking of not filing, I
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1	don't recommend it.
2	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Can we ask a
3	couple of questions about this subject, or do you
4	want us to hold our questions to the end?
5	MS. HEPLER: Can you wait until I get
6	through the financial disclosure requirements and
7	then you can ask me the questions?
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay, sure.
9	MS. HEPLER: Okay. Let's go to the next
10	one. Okay. And this goes to the electronic filing
11	versus the other the paper filing. And as you
12	know, and especially if you want to file paper do it
13	before the end of this year. As of next year, you're
14	going to be required to do it on line.
15	Also, I recommend, because there have
16	been people that have left, Special Assistants,
17	before that if you're using the online system, we
18	can set it up so you can access it afterward, but I
19	suggest for all of you that you click it the day you
20	leave if you're doing it online, because you're not
21	supposed to do it before you leave within 30 days,
22	but if you click it the day you leave and say
23	submit, that'll take care of your filing. And that's
24	why I asked for the personal information; if I have
25	any questions, I can contact you after you leave.
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1 Also, I may have to set it up, the 2 system, to put in your personal email to contact you because, obviously, your regular email, government 3 4 email will be shut off. Okay? I think there's one more. Is there one more? Let's see. I think that was 5 the filing, if you want to file paper or not. Okay. 6 Go ahead. 7 8 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: There's a couple of questions I may ask later, but if we're one of 9 the people who will be reappointed but there's a 10 11 gap, I assume there's no need to -- there may be a 12 situation where like Commissioner Yaki, it was 13 unclear, and it was 30 -- anyway. 14 MS. HEPLER: You're going to have to file 15 a termination, unfortunately, and then file a new one when there's a gap like that. 16 17 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: What if there is 18 19 COMMISSIONER YAKI: That's what I did. 20 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: But how could you 21 do any work after you're not a Commissioner because 22 that's forbidden by law, anyway? Those are some of 23 the little things that we can get --24 MS. HEPLER: Well, that's why I'm saying 25 -- a good thing -- if you get it ready and you can **NEAL R. 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1	submit it on your last day. That's what I always
2	advise people.
3	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: We'll probably
4	work through some of those issues, I suppose, as
5	they get a little clearer. But it seems to me
6	there's a couple of things that for those who
7	might be continuing, you wouldn't need to file one.
8	Right?
9	MS. HEPLER: No, you still need to
10	because technically your term ends. If you're
11	reappointed before the term ends then you're
12	continuing and there's no termination.
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay.
14	MS. HEPLER: But once it terminates and
15	you're off, then that's a termination. Even if you
16	come back only two weeks later. I know it sounds
17	bizarre, but that's how it works.
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay.
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: But isn't that a
20	question. Isn't that a contradiction to the fixed
21	term requirement, because if it's meant to run as a
22	fixed term, how can you be reappointed before your
23	term actually expires, because it's supposed to run
24	
25	MS. HEPLER: I don't know I just I
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2	haven't dealt with that. I'm from the ethics area.
3	If you terminate, then you have to file a
4	termination. If you come back
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I seem to recall that
6	if back in the time period that I was dealing
7	with, the my term expired I think December 12th
8	or something, December I don't know what the heck
9	it I think December 15th. And even though I was
10	submitted in November to be reappointed for that
11	time, it didn't go through. One of the thoughts was
12	that, nevertheless, even though I continue, that
13	first term did expire and, therefore, a new term
14	began and someone determined at that time that I
15	would have to file anyway because the term expired
16	because we are dealing with fixed terms.
17	MS. HEPLER: Yes, you're right. You're
18	dealing with fixed terms.
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes.
20	MS. HEPLER: I didn't think where I
21	was before, in that case one of the Commissioner's
22	terms expired and the President appointed her a
23	two-year gave her a two-year extension so she
24	didn't have to, but you're right.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Right.
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1	MS. HEPLER: Yes, the term does end on a
2	fixed date. Right. But if you have more questions,
3	you know, we can talk offline about it. Okay, let's
4	go.
5	That's just asking you for your contact
6	information, and I pass the sheets around. Okay?
7	And seeking employment, and most of the
8	Commissioners that's not an issue because most of
9	you have full-time or outside jobs and work. This is
10	more aimed at the Special Assistants. If you are
11	looking for employment, you're disqualified from
12	working on matters with a potential employer that
13	may affect your financial interest, or that
14	employer's, and you have to look to see if there's a
15	conflict of interest or apparent conflict. And if
16	there is, you have to recuse yourself.
17	With these I'm going through seeking
18	employment and post-employment. And these
19	specifically, come to see me if you have questions
20	because they're going to be very general and broad,
21	but we can go into it more in detail individually.
22	And when you say seeking employment,
23	it's when you're talking to the person. Let's say
24	the employer has contacted you about possible
25	employment and you say I'm interested. You contact
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1	the potential employer, or you're engaged in actual
2	negotiations for employment, which brings up another
3	topic. Okay.
4	Oh, this is one other thing. Interview
5	expenses, it's very interesting. If you get you
6	can accept gifts of meals, lodging, transportation,
7	other benefits if they're flying you out for
8	interviews. It's a little exception to the Gifts
9	Rule. Okay.
10	And we're going back to the stock back,
11	remember the stock backs. If you are in
12	negotiations, then you have to file a notification
13	statement within three business days after
14	commencing employment negotiations. Let's say you
15	get the interview and then they say we're
16	interesting in hiring you, and you start discussing
17	salary. At that time the three days would start. If
18	you're just submitting a resume and you haven't
19	heard back, then you don't need to file the
20	notification statement. And there's the form, and I
21	will send it out to everybody so they have it to
22	fill it out. And when past Special Assistants have
23	left, they have filled out the form when they have
24	employment out there.
25	Okay, post-employment. And there's a
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1	couple of bans that are interesting. One is a
2	full-time lifetime ban, and I don't think it will
3	really apply to any of you. But it is something that
4	you've worked on personally and substantially as a
5	government employee and there's a the United
6	States is a party and the direct and substantial
7	interest in the matter. And we handle more general
8	things, but if you have any questions come see me.
9	That's more if you worked on something specific, and
10	it later comes back, contract, grant, something like
11	that. But if you have anything let me know, and we
12	can discuss it one on one. Okay?
13	This is an interesting one I wasn't
14	aware of because I hadn't dealt with Commissioners
15	who were Special Government Employees, but it turns
16	out that this does apply to you.
17	There's a one-year cooling off period
18	for Commissioners from representing another before
19	the former Agency to seek official action. If you
20	notice I said another because most of when you
21	come to talk, you would represent yourself. If you
22	said you're representing some organization or
23	something then there would be an issue, but if you
24	come up as a panelist and say these are my views,
25	that's perfectly acceptable.
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1	If you have any questions please see me,
2	because this one actually is a criminal violation.
3	And it came up and this was sort of an example.
4	One time there was a high-level doctor at HHS where
5	I worked, and she retired, and we didn't even know
6	talk about file a termination, because she came
7	back working for herself as a consultant and her
8	email address was the same, so we didn't get the
9	form. We didn't know she had left. And then it
10	turned out the IRS was coming and saying well,
11	you're not paying her benefits or the taxes so you
12	have to get someone to be a contractor. So, then we
13	had there was a service, and she worked for them.
14	Well, it turned out that was another because she was
15	working for a contracting service, so that was
16	actually criminal. She wasn't charged, but you can't
17	do that. Okay.
18	And there's also something, this applies
19	to the Special Assistants only. If you recall there
20	was the Ethics Pledge, and there's a lobbying ban in
21	it. And if you talk to are interested in working
22	for a lobbying organization of some sort, please
23	come see me and we'll discuss the specific provision
24	and its applicability to you. Okay?
25	Now, we're going to get to the other
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2	stuff, or in the back. So, if you lead off with your
3	Commission title, is that making it too prominent?
4	MS. HEPLER: Well, we can you know,
5	we'll talk about that. If you have it in there, you
6	know, among she has it among many things. I
7	think you do, too. I don't remember. I remember I've
8	worked on your bio. I have to look at it again to
9	see.
10	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes.
11	MS. HEPLER: I know
12	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, it was up front,
13	but then they put it
14	MS. HEPLER: Put it sort of not in the
15	okay. We'll talk about it.
16	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay.
17	MS. HEPLER: Okay. And then this one
18	here, she can say she's the former Vice Chair of the
19	U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. It doesn't need
20	anything else. Likewise, if you're writing an
21	article or a blog, you can say former, you know, if
22	you want. It's up to you whether or not you want to
23	put it in there. You don't have to put any
24	disclaimers or anything anymore because you're not a
25	federal government employee. Okay. And the same for
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the Special Assistants, you can say you're a former

Special Assistant.

non-public 3 And now we're getting to 4 information and government records. Non-public 5 information includes but not limited to information that's exempt from disclosure under the Freedom of 6 7 information Information Act, the agency has designated as confidential, information that has not 8 actually been disseminated to the general public and 9 is not authorized to be made available to the --10 11 that is the old one. The new one didn't get up 12 there, public upon request. I'm sorry, I don't know one would end up there. Okay. 13

14 Examples are subpoenaed documents. If we 15 subpoena something and don't use it, you can't -it's not open to the public to view. 16 Privacy 17 protected information, comments from the public, Advisory members, 18 employee and State personal 19 telephone numbers and address, Social Security 20 numbers, those sort of things. Okay?

21 And here are some things -- and now 22 we're also going to federal records. And federal 23 records include organizations, functions, policies, 24 decisions, procedures, and operations, or other 25 information that contain information about you. And

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examples are -- go back one.

1

2 I know what happened. This is when the computer went down and it didn't save all 3 the 4 changes, I'm sorry. It's paper files, electronic 5 files, images, video and audio recording, websites, 6 social media. We don't have that. We have website, 7 databases, shared file drives, email, all that is government records under the Federal Records Act. 8 9 Okay. And you're not supposed to remove the records federal government custody without proper 10 from 11 authorization. Okay. And this is what I've done before. 12 Ιf you have any questions, please come see me and we'll 13 14 discuss whether or not these can go, or you can take 15 them with you, or that they should stay here.

Extra copies of records, you know, that 16 17 are not privacy protected you could take, or non-work, other work-related materials, non-record 18 19 materials. For example, if you print out copies of 20 cases or CFRs, you can take those. Documentary 21 material that's purely personal, of course, your 22 time, pay, leave, whatever. And then your personal 23 matters include family and personal correspondence, materials documenting professional activities and 24 25 outside business or political pursuits even though,

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1	you know, let's say you have something you're going
2	to, some society meeting and you keep your schedule
3	there, you can take that with you. You can take your
4	personal stuff, but if it's agency stuff, be
5	careful. Okay? Any questions?
6	Okay. I wish those of you who are not
7	coming back the best in your future. Okay?
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. So, now we have a
9	revised agenda, so we're going to move now to
10	discussion and vote on the 2014 Statutory
11	Enforcement Topic.
12	IV. PROGRAM PLANNING
13	2014 STATUTORY ENFORCEMENT REPORT TOPIC
14	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: As you all recall I
15	thought this was always going to stay on for me as
16	Chairman, but I guess not. So, we're now going to
17	discuss and vote on a replacement project for our
18	2014 Statutory Enforcement Report.
19	Those of you recall that after we voted
20	on the drug policy concept paper, there were some
21	concerns about whether or not it met with the
22	requirement for a Statutory Enforcement Report.
23	Those concerns were raised by our General Counsel's
24	office. I know there had been a lot of back and
25	forth between Commissioners and agency staff over
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1 that issue. There have been some informal among 2 discussions Commissioners how as to to 3 proceed.

4 We wanted to proceed quickly because we 5 know we need to give our staff the time to really 6 plan out the Statutory Enforcement Report. So, what 7 we've decided to present to you this morning for consideration is a global motion that will address 8 9 both the issue of the replacement of the Statutory Enforcement Report topic, as well as swapping out of 10 11 a prior concept paper for a briefing that we had on and 12 the Online Accessibility with another ADA concept paper from our Conservative colleagues. So, 13 I will make a motion for discussion purposes and 14 15 then we will move forward.

So, I will move that we substitute the 16 17 previously approved Drug Policy Concept Paper which 18 was approved as our Statutory Enforcement Report 19 topic, and replace that with a concept paper distributed by Commissioner Kladney on the issue of 20 21 patient dumping. You all have that in your 22 materials. And that would replace the Drug Policy 23 Concept Paper as our 2014 Statutory Enforcement 24 Topic.

25

And, in addition, that we would replace

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2	previously approved by the Commission as a briefing
3	topic, and replace it with a topic presented by
4	Commissioner Heriot on Sexual Harassment in Higher
5	Education. And also she amended that to add K-12.
6	So, that is the motion. Is there a second?
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Second.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Any discussion on
9	that? Do you want to say something, Commissioner
10	Heriot?
11	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes, I just -
12	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Make sure your mic is
13	on, though.
14	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I just wanted to
15	say that on the issue of whether or not we have (a)
16	jurisdiction, and (b) whether it qualifies as a
17	Statutory Enforcement Report, I'm confident that at
18	least one of these reports that we're voting on will
19	qualify, so I can support it on that basis.
20	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Any other
21	comments or discussions? Where did Commissioner
22	Gaziano go?
23	DIRECTOR SALLO: Chairman Castro, if I
24	may?
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, Madam Staff
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Director.

1

2	DIRECTOR SALLO: If everyone would
3	indulge me for a moment. I wanted to take an
4	opportunity to thank staff because for the past
5	three months they have worked very diligently on the
6	current topics that we had before us. They have done
7	extensive research. They have set forth a project
8	outline, and they have also come out with a
9	Statutory Report time line, so I did not want that
10	to go unnoticed.

At this point in time, I would hope that as we move forward the topics that we have so extensively researched may be considered in the future and adopted as a potential briefing so that work does not go to waste.

Secondly, as it applies to the topic 16 17 that Commissioner Heriot is bringing forth, is there a concept paper that perhaps staff could take a look 18 19 at, because when I hear the title I get a little nervous that it's like all-encompassing, and it's 20 21 going to be really vague. So, I just want to make 22 sure that we have something to go by, so that we 23 could start taking a look at it.

24 COMMISSIONER HERIOT: We have a paragraph 25 written on it, and we can easily expand that if

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1	you'd like us to.
2	DIRECTOR SALLO: Please, so that we I
3	know we have the blurb, but I was wondering if
4	anything else had been expanded.
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: We can do that for
6	you.
7	DIRECTOR SALLO: Okay, thank you. So, I'm
8	going to make a plug, and my plug is as we move
9	forward to schedule the Statutory Enforcement
10	Report, if we could possibly target February 14th,
11	it really cuts the time extremely short for us to
12	have the hearing on that day, but that is the only
13	way that we can physically get the report out within
14	our statutory mandate.
15	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes. That's going to be
16	the next topic after we vote on this. So, first we
17	want to get the topics nailed down. Any other
18	questions, issues? If not, then I will take a roll
19	call vote. We had a second. Right? Yes.
20	So, Madam Vice Chair, how do you vote?
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. Okay. The
22	answer is yes.
23	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Commissioner
24	Kirsanow, how do you vote?
25	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yes.
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Lo not quote or rely on the 1	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commission on Civil Rights at transcripts@usdcr.gov.
2	how do you vote?
3	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes.
4	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Gaziano
5	has stepped out. Commissioner Achtenberg, how do you
6	vote?
7	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Yes.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Yaki, how
9	do you vote?
10	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes.
11	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Kladney,
12	how do you vote?
13	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: Yes.
14	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: And I vote yes, so it
15	passes unanimously. All right. Thank you, everybody,
16	really appreciate that.
17	IV. PROGRAM PLANNING
18	SCHEDULE TWO BRIEFINGS FOR 2014
19	THE STATUTORY ENFORCEMENT TOPIC and the
20	"ENFORCING THE AMERICANS WITH
21	DISABILITIES ACT ONLINE."
22	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: The next item is to
23	set up a schedule for the briefing on that topic.
24	The concept paper, and I guess we should also set up
25	a briefing date for the sexual harassment paper. But
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1	first let's deal with the Statutory Enforcement
2	Report.
3	I agree with Madam Staff Director that
4	the sooner we can do this the better. What if we
5	do this on February 14th, it would require that
6	Commissioners come into D.C. twice in February
7	because we currently have our meeting schedule for
8	December, I'm sorry, February 28th.
9	What I would like for us to consider is
10	possibly moving our meeting to the 14th, from the
11	28th to the 14th so that we can come in once, save
12	additional dollars in terms of having to fly back
13	twice. If need be, we could work a long day so we
14	can do any work that we need to do for our monthly
15	meeting, and then go into the briefing.
16	I don't know what people's schedules
17	look like. I know some folks won't be here anymore
18	so it doesn't matter.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I was going to
20	say
21	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: But those that
22	anticipate that you might be back, you might want to

24	could make that a form of a motion if it works.

4	anti-minority small business. I have to say, I'm
5	kind of confused by that, or not confused, but
6	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, I just think that
7	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: taken aback by
8	that. But are there
9	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: I would think
10	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Are there
11	suggestions, constructive suggestions that can be
12	made from those who didn't vote to approve this,
13	concrete suggestions, perhaps, that to put it in
14	a form that you all might find acceptable?

14	revision sent around yesterday because I didn't
15	notice that I had failed to include the first part
16	of that for Part B. So, what I would like to do is
17	for discussion purposes make a motion to approve the
18	Part B that was circulated yesterday. Do I have a
19	second? We've got a second from Commissioner
20	Achtenberg. Any discussion on that? I believe
21	everyone should have a copy of that.
22	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Can we give me a
23	chance to read this?
24	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Sure, sure. It's
25	basically a that's the one. It repeats what was
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2	read anyway, but that statement was previously
3	circulated. Let me know when you all are ready to
4	discuss. And as you consider this, you really should
5	not take into account that we got you some
6	cupcakes.

8	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Don't worry, we
9	won't.
10	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: We are looking at Part
11	B of the Eminent Domain Abuse report which is
12	proposed findings a proposed finding and some
13	proposed recommendations. The revised version was
14	circulated last night. It adds Recommendations 1-6,
15	which were in my statement, but I neglected to have
16	them put into my proposed Part B recommendations.
17	Are folks ready? We could take these one
18	by one, or do it en masse, however I mean we have
19	technically a motion already on the floor for them
20	in entirety, but I'm willing to put that motion
21	aside and go one by one, if you'd like, or you may
22	decide you don't even want to support any of these.
23	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I think they're a
24	package.
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay.

2	whatever procedure you want, but I think they're a

4	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. We'll deal with
5	them as a package then. So, we have a motion on the
6	floor to approve these this one finding and seven
7	proposed recommendations to the Civil Rights
8	Implications of Eminent Domain Abuse. Any
9	discussion? Commissioner Heriot?
10	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I have a number of
11	problems with this. One, like in seven, the
12	suggestion that we want to standardize this, and
13	it's a question of uniformity. I don't agree with
14	that.
15	On number three, amending the Fair
16	Housing Act to clarify that it applies to
17	condemnation of residences without regard to intent,
18	I'm not even sure what you mean by that, so I would
19	oppose the package on that basis.
20	Also, in number six, that there should
21	be an unbiased empirical study using rigorous social
22	science standards; since we're a Commission that's
23	supposed to conduct research like that it seems kind
24	of odd to be recommending that somebody else do it.
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, someone else who
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1	has the resources.
2	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes, but I'm sort
3	of embarrassed to make a recommendation like
4	somebody with the resources should do this, so I
5	intend to vote no on the package.
б	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Commissioner
7	Gaziano?
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes, there's
9	several that I disagree with, and I don't think the
10	others really stand on their own. And there are none
11	that I'm so, I think it would I did look at
12	these before, so I know you since you provided
13	them before, I'm not saying you didn't provide them
14	with some time for us.
15	I think that I have a concern with
16	you know, residents often get don't have some of
17	the resources that commercial residents, but
18	creating saying that some property owners have
19	more taking rights than others is a little
20	concerning to me. Again, I don't think there needs
21	to be or should be uniformity in just compensation
22	and takings laws, since states can provide more than
23	the constitutional floor, and we like laboratories
24	of democracy.
25	You know, I think part of the problem,
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	69
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2	Court that made the mistake in Kelo and public use.
3	Again, local jurisdictions can and should do more
4	than what the real meaning of constitution is that
5	the Supreme Court abandoned. So, I'm for those
6	reasons, I don't think that I can support these.
7	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay, anybody else?
8	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yes, Mr. Chair.
9	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes?
10	(Off microphone comments.)
11	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: You need to turn your
12	mic on.
13	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: I'd align my
14	comments with those of Commissioners Gaziano and
15	Heriot. I don't think that there should be, unless
16	individual states decide to come up with a different
17	formula, a distinction, or I don't see really the
18	reason for a distinction at this point between
19	certain types of property owners, commercial versus
20	resident.
21	In addition to which, the second
22	proposed recommendation, I think I understand the
23	impetus behind it, but then, again, tenants are not
24	owners of the property, and I am not sure that they
25	would be entitled to compensation. And beyond that,
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1	as I said, I would align my comments with those of
2	my other two Commissioners.
3	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Any comments over here
4	on the Democrat side? Commissioner Kladney?
5	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: I also intend to
6	vote no on this. I believe that each state and
7	jurisdiction should fend for itself, and have its
8	own definitions of what it needs. I'm sure everybody
9	has had an opportunity to read my statement.
10	I think that when it comes to making
11	just compensation payments, people who own
12	residential properties, depending on the state and
13	jurisdiction, get not just compensation for their
14	property, they get relocation money, they get all
15	sorts of other stuff, excuse me, compensation. And I
16	believe that, you know, every jurisdiction should
17	decide for itself whether it should have a
18	redevelopment plan or not accept redevelopment in
19	the Kelo sense of the word. And the Supreme Court
20	does have the final word and definition on this, and
21	they have decided so far to uphold redevelopment
22	types of projects.
23	I believe that every jurisdiction has
24	the right to choose its own method of how it wants
25	to impose Eminent Domain in its jurisdiction. Thank
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1	you.
2	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Any other comments
3	before we vote? Commissioner Yaki?
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes, thank you very
5	much. I support the Chairman's proposal, but given
б	the fact that it's probably not going to pass, I was
7	not going to make any I was thinking of making
8	amendments, but I don't think that it's worth the
9	time, other than to simply make a few remarks about
10	the issue of eminent domain.
11	While I agree with many of my colleagues
12	that this is an issue that is very state or even
13	municipality- specific, I think that the impact in
14	terms of the Civil Rights laws and impact on
15	minorities in this country is has a nationwide
16	impact.
17	I think that given when you think about
18	the fact that our Civil Rights laws are meant to
19	protect people across state boundaries, to be able
20	to cross state lines to go to places of economic
21	opportunity wherever they may be, the odd
22	juxtaposition of redevelopment laws and eminent
23	domain often result in the exact opposite, which is
24	to drive people away from areas where they could or
25	had economic prosperity, safe housing, and a place
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that they called their home or their neighborhood.

2 Too often in these instances, in a rush 3 dependent on the economic times, the tax base, any 4 number of different factors, municipalities go into 5 these with good ideas and good intentions. But as we all know, the raison d'etre of our Civil Rights laws 6 7 is that there may be good ideas and good intentions, but without monitoring and enforcement, and real 8 measurement of what the impact would be, you have 9 these, I think, situations where communities are 10 11 disrupted, divided, and a second diaspora occurs for 12 many of these communities. And money doesn't solve the problem. It's more fundamental in that it goes 13 14 to the roots of political power, it goes to the 15 roots of community empowerment, issues of economic, environmental, racial justice 16 are frequently 17 intertwined with these types of activities. And this barely scratches the surface of the complexities of 18 what goes on in these types of takings. 19 And like what we said about perhaps the 20

21 other briefing that we alluded to, I was not here 22 for this briefing. This is one of those briefings 23 where I believe I was gone for -- not of my own 24 choosing, but it's something where, obviously, this 25 something would is that Ι have structured

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1	differently. I would have held the briefing
2	differently. There are many more facets to this than
3	meet the eye. And as a beginning, this is okay, but
4	it's nothing anywhere near addressing the depth and
5	the human cost that eminent domain nowadays inflicts
6	upon many minority communities in America.
7	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Mr. Chairman?
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes.
9	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Can I make one more
10	comment?
11	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, you may.
12	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Well, I just wanted
13	to comment on that section, providing more
14	procedural protections or compensation for residents
15	than to commercial property owners. A respectable
16	argument can be made that would go just the other
17	way around, actually, and that is that certain
18	commercial businesses have a big ticket item that is
19	left off, and that is customer goodwill. If I were
20	to run a restaurant and have a loyal clientele in a
21	particular neighborhood and I have to move just like
22	three miles away because of an eminent domain issue,
23	those clients, you know, those customers won't come,
24	and I've lost something really very profound;
25	whereas, a resident's move may be less of a problem.
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Do not quote or rely on this ur	But certain businesses, on the other
2	hand, don't have that sort of customer goodwill
3	that's attached to a particular location the way a
4	restaurant or a small store might. So, I actually
5	think there are going to be a lot of cases where
6	it's the commercial property owner who has the
7	bigger problem rather than the smaller problem.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Point well taken. All
9	right. Well, let's take a vote on this.
10	Madam Vice Chair, how do you vote on
11	Part B?
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No.
13	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Kirsanow,
14	how do you vote?
15	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: No.

7	motion fails, but I'm pleased that I was able to
8	bring you all together in a bipartisan way to oppose
9	my motion.
10	(Laughter.)
11	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Not all.
12	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Not all, you know, you
13	had a Democrat join.
14	So, next we have a number of updates on
15	some of our reports, so I will turn the stage over
16	to our Staff Director. Madam Staff Director, the
17	floor is yours.
18	DIRECTOR SALLO: Commissioners, at this
19	point in time we do have an in-house editor for a
20	six-month period who has worked she's working
21	diligently to make sure that all of our current
22	reports that are in the pipeline are taken care of,
23	and edited with covers and everything in order to
24	get it out. The next two reports that are in queue
25	are the Sex Trafficking report, along with the Arab
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1	and Muslim report. And after that, we'll take the
2	rest in order with the hope that we can complete
3	everything and issue these reports no later than
4	April of next year.
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Any questions for the
6	Staff Director? Hearing none, we will move on to our
7	next topic which is a vote on the results of the
8	telephonic vote no? What's next? Okay, so we just
9	have to put it on the record.
10	IV. PROGRAM PLANNING
11	RESULTS OF THE TELEPHONIC VOTE
12	HELD ON JULY 21, 2013
13	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. So, we are
14	putting on the record so, I need to read those?
15	How do I do this? What do I read? I have to read the
16	whole thing?
17	DIRECTOR SALLO: Well, there have been
18	questions because folks seem to have been unaware
19	that we held a telephonic meeting, so I just wanted
20	to make sure that we put on the record the date that
21	the telephonic meeting took place, and what the
22	results were of the actual vote for the findings and
23	recs.
24	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay, so let me put
25	that on the record. The meeting was held on July
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1	21st, 2013, which was a Sunday, to vote on the
2	findings and recommendations for the 2013 Statutory
3	Report on Sexual Assault in the Military. Since the
4	Commission did not hold meetings in September or
5	October, this was overlooked at the August 2013
6	meeting. That's why it's on the agenda today.
7	The result of that telephonic call was
8	that there was no consensus on the findings and
9	recommendations for the 2013 Statutory Enforcement
10	report, which has subsequently been published and
11	released by a September 30th statutory deadline.
12	IV. PROGRAM PLANNING
13	PROPOSALS FOR THE COMMEMORATION OF THE
14	13TH AND 14TH AMENDMENTS
15	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. So, now we will
16	move on to the next topic, which is a joint proposal
17	that Commissioner Heriot and I have circulated to
18	the Commission for commemoration of the 13th and
19	14th Amendment anniversaries which will be coming up
20	in due course over the next period of time.
21	Hopefully, everyone has had an opportunity to review
22	those.
23	This is similar to what we did with
24	Lincoln Cottage, although at this point, obviously,
25	we're not identifying an entity like Lincoln Cottage
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Do not quote or rely on this un	to partner with, but we've sort of set forward a
2	framework for directions that we might take this in.
3	And I'll actually ask Commissioner Heriot to chime
4	in, as well, and then we'll make a motion.
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Okay. I just wanted
6	to say that the anniversary of the 13th and 14th
7	Amendments is an extremely important date in our
8	history, and I think that the Commission on Civil
9	Rights has a responsibility to try to make sure that
10	it is properly commemorated, and we bring in as many
11	organizations and various entities as we can to make
12	sure that this gets celebrated with all the dignity
13	that it should be celebrated.
14	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: So, for discussion
15	purposes let me make a motion based on the proposal
16	that was submitted and circulated to all of you by
17	myself, and by Commissioner Heriot. Do I have a
18	second?
19	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Second.
20	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Any discussion,
21	questions? Commissioner Achtenberg?
22	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Mr. Chairman, I
23	think this is an excellent proposal. I think it
24	follows nicely on the cooperative effort we
25	undertook last year with the Lincoln Cottage to
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Do not quote or rely on this	commemorate the Emancipation Proclamation which, by
2	the way, I don't feel we've publicized the product
3	of which gathering was generated as broadly as I
4	hope we intend to going forward. And I like the
5	emphasis in this new proposal on having contact with
6	the states, and encouraging state legislatures, as
7	well, to recognize this in locally appropriate ways.
8	Involving our Regional Directors and State Advisory
9	
	Committees, I think, is a nice touch, as well. So, I
10	think it's really an excellent proposal, and I
11	intend to support it.
12	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Thank you. Any other
13	questions, comments from members of the Commission?
14	Hearing none, then let us take a vote on this.
15	Madam Vice Chair, how do you vote?
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I think it's an
17	excellent proposal. I'm not sure I should be voting
18	on anything
19	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Oh, yes, you should.
20	You're a sitting Commissioner. You have the right to
21	vote.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right. Okay.
23	Yes. I vote yes.
24	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Kirsanow,
25	how do you vote?
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1	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yes.
2	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Heriot,
3	how do you vote?
4	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes.
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Gaziano,
6	how do you vote?
7	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner
9	Achtenberg, how do you vote?
10	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Yes.
11	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Yaki, how
12	do you vote?
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Aye.
14	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Kladney,
15	how do you vote?
16	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: Yes.
17	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: And I vote yes. It's
18	unanimous. Thank you all, this is good. Another
19	bipartisan program that we're going to really be
20	proud of, so thank you.
21	IV. PROGRAM PLANNING
22	LETTER TO DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE
23	ON BEHALF OF SIKH MILITARY MEMBERS
24	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Next we have on the
25	agenda a proposal, I know some of us have talked
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1	about this, and I previously before the shutdown
2	have circulated a draft of a letter to the
3	Department of Defense regarding the issue that was
4	brought to our attention in our May briefing by
5	Major Kalsi about the concern in the Sikh American
6	community about certain policies of the Department
7	of Defense prohibiting possibly prohibiting
8	service of Sikh Americans and other members of
9	different religious minorities unless they gave up
10	their Articles of Faith. In the case of the Sikh
11	Americans, their beard, their unshorn hair, and
12	their turban.
13	There was a concern among many of us
14	about that issue, and rather than wait for a report
15	to come out, we wanted to put forward a letter. The
16	initial letter that I circulated was not,
17	necessarily, the direction that most folks wanted to
18	go in, so what I've done is revised it to make it
19	more of an inquiry to the Department of Defense to
20	allow them to provide us their perspective on this
21	issue before we draft our report, as opposed to
22	approaching them with a view that we already
23	considered this to be a problem and wanted them to
24	do something about it.
25	So, I've tried with the assistance of a

2	inquisitive, more of an inquiry than the original
3	letter was. So, hopefully, you've all had a chance
4	to look at that letter. And I don't know if folks
5	have any comments or questions before we make a
6	motion on that.
7	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: Mr. Chairman?
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes, Commissioner
9	Kladney?
10	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: I actually believe
11	that we should let the staff make general inquiry,
12	get as much information as possible from Department
13	of Defense included in the report. I don't think a
14	letter of this sort really covers the entire gamut
15	of the four different services, and whatever.
16	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Any other
17	comments? If not, I will move that we accept and
18	approve this letter. Is there a second?
19	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Second.
20	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Let me take a
21	vote.
22	Madam Vice Chair, how do you vote?
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm deferring my
24	vote for a minute.
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. Commissioner
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1	Kirsanow, how do you vote?
2	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yes.
3	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Heriot,
4	how do you vote?
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I vote yes. I just
6	wanted to comment, there's an acronym in here that
7	we don't define.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay, which one is
9	that?
10	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I think it's EMS.
11	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay, we'll define that
12	then.
13	Commissioner Gaziano, how do you vote?
14	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes.
15	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner
16	Achtenberg, how do you vote?
17	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Yaki, how
19	do you vote?
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Aye.
21	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Commissioner Kladney?
22	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: Abstain.
23	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Madam Vice Chair?
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'll vote yes.
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: And I vote yes. Okay,
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1	so the letter passes unanimously and we will define
2	EMS. I believe we have Commissioner Kladney,
3	although you voted no, would you
4	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: I abstained.
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Oh, you abstained.
6	Would you consider still signing the letter, or not?
7	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: I'll sign it.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Okay. So, I think we
9	have all of the Commissioner's electronic signatures
10	so we'll insure that that's done. Thank you very
11	much, appreciate this.
12	Now we move on to Management and
13	Operations. Madam Staff Director, the floor is yours
14	again.
15	V. MANAGEMENT AND OPERATIONS
16	STAFF DIRECTOR'S REPORT
17	DIRECTOR SALLO: Thank you.
18	Commissioners, I just wanted to provide an update,
19	and I wanted to use the framework of our current
20	Strategic Action Plan to provide you with updates.
21	As you know, as we move toward submitting our budget
22	request in February, we have to provide an update as
23	to how far we've gotten along on certain goals and
24	objectives that are contained within our Strategic
25	Action Plan. So, as it stands right now Goal A
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1	pretty much refers to the reports that we issue.
2	And, obviously, that is an ongoing process, and we
3	do have several reports that are in queue. And as of
4	today, we've now scheduled some upcoming briefings,
5	so that goal will continuously be updated.
6	In reference to Goal B, it indicates
7	that we would regularly provide new objective
8	information and analysis on Civil Rights issues.
9	And, obviously, when this was put into effect, the
10	one project that we had in the pipeline was the
11	Stand Your Ground project.
12	As you know, today we voted to hold a
13	briefing, but in reference to the actual report that
14	was submitted for consideration by Commissioner
15	Yaki, what we have done with the help of staff along
16	with our interns, Richard Ahne, and Reziya
17	Brumfield, and Ms. Stitcher, we have gone forward
18	and we have looked at at least half of what was
19	requested within the project, I guess, outline that
20	was provided by Commissioner Yaki, so I will be more
21	than happy to disseminate after our meeting today a
22	status on the different sections that we have looked
23	at. We have gathered lots of research. We have
24	looked into some of the data that's out there. At
25	the present time, we're also trying to get data from
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1 FDLE so that we can also take a look at the analysis 2 that has already been done. There are some agencies 3 in the community that have taken the data that we 4 were proposing to look at and they have analyzed it 5 themselves. And the Congressional Research Service 6 is my understanding as a result of a hearing that I 7 recently attended, that they've also done this analysis. So, we're in the process of collecting 8 that, because if the analysis is along the same 9 lines of what we were proposing, then I think it 10 11 behooves us not to reinvent the wheel, and use the 12 information that they've provided as we move forward in cultivating our project. 13

14 As we move on to Strategic Goal C, this 15 one deals with apprizing individuals of Civil Rights laws and policies. And it also had some interior, 16 17 I'm sorry, some goals and objectives that applied within the agency itself, so I wanted to advise 18 everyone, as I previously indicated, we do have a 19 contractor on board for six months who's helping us 20 21 not only with the actual reports. Rather than hiring 22 an individual contractor for a report, we just have 23 someone in-house doing all the reports. But at the 24 same time, we are revising our style guide which is 25 what staff uses as they draft the reports. And we're

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1	also revising our Uncle Sam publication, and in
2	addition to that, we will be translating our Uncle
3	Sam publication into Spanish, as indicated in the
4	Strategic Action Plan.
5	We're also tracking complaints online.
б	We receive a lot of complaints from correctional
7	facilities, so in meeting with staff we have
8	determined that there are some issues out there that
9	keep arising from certain facilities, so we're going
10	to track them so that we can then report any
11	significant findings to the Department of Justice,
12	since it is our job to refer complaints to them. But
13	I'd rather have it be specific types of complaints
14	where we can say in X Correctional Facility we've
15	identified these two issues as a result of this
16	number of complaints.
17	In addition to that, we have discussed
18	also mapping complaints that we receive nationwide
19	because sometimes when you map, you're able to
20	identify specific issues in a region. So, we are
21	also working on doing that as part of our
22	Clearinghouse project, and as part of our complaint
23	process.
24	As we move forward, we will also be
25	updating our website, removing items off the website
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website so that it becomes a bit more user-friendly.

that are out of date, and pretty much tightening the

3 One of the additions to that will be to 4 actually provide links to all of the federal 5 agencies within their Civil Rights Department, rather than having folks call us and then we having 6 7 to speak to someone and say well, we don't actually investigate the complaint. We'll have to refer you 8 9 someplace else. It makes more sense to actually provide that information on the website and provide 10 11 an active link that will take them directly to the 12 Civil Rights Division of the respective agency. So, 13 the goal would be to establish that in English, and 14 then ultimately in Spanish, and any other language 15 that we may identify in the future that is prominent in reference to queries that we receive from the 16 17 public.

As we look at Strategic Goal D, which is 18 improving 19 about the Commission's profile and 20 effectiveness in communicating with the general 21 public, some of what I just spoke about also falls 22 under this umbrella, but in addition to that, we had 23 indicated that we would be translating some reports 24 into Spanish. We have identified four SAC reports 25 from different regions that addressed that affect

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1	the Latino community, and as a result those four
2	reports will be translated. And, in addition, we
3	will be translating into Spanish the Bullying
4	report, and that will also be issued. So, at the
5	present time, I believe the Illinois report is
6	completed in Spanish. We're moving on to a
7	Connecticut report, a Texas report, and I can't
8	remember the fourth state, my apologies. So, we're
9	in the process of doing that.
10	As it applies to our website, I'm happy
11	to say that we just had a test run yesterday with
12	Ready Talk, and Ready Talk will allow us to actually
13	hold webinars with not only our staff, but our SAC
14	members. So, Ready Talk will be used next week for a
15	mandatory two- day training that all staff and
16	regional offices will have to participate in on
17	report writing.
18	As we move forward, it is very important
19	when we draft our reports that there's consistency,
20	and that there's uniformity. And templates are
21	necessary, so we have someone coming on board to
22	provide training to staff for two days. They will
23	leave us with templates and everyone will be on the
24	same page as it applies to what is required in a
25	report, and what is needed in a report for it to be
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1	effective, and to allow us to present the material
2	in the best light to the public. So, we are working
3	on that, as well.
4	I know that Commissioner Kladney has
5	been hoping and praying for video conferencing, so
6	at this point in time we're hoping that we can test
7	that in January. So, we will keep everyone abreast
8	of how that is going, but the goal is for that.
9	We've put all the wires in to allow us to do that,
10	and we have the equipment to do the Ready Talk. Now
11	we just have to get the audio set up, and then we'll
12	be able to do a test run.
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Does that mean that
14	Commissioner Kladney can participate in a conference
15	with just a picture of his head on his chair?
16	DIRECTOR SALLO: Wouldn't be any
17	different, but then we go on to
18	(Laughter.)
19	DIRECTOR SALLO: Sorry. We go on to
20	Strategic Goal E, where we discuss strengthening the
21	Commission's financial and operational controls.
22	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Can I ask a
23	question?
24	DIRECTOR SALLO: Yes, ma'am.
25	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Is that live
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2	DIRECTOR SALLO: That is also another
3	component that we will hope to do a test run in
4	January, yes.
5	COMMISSIONER ACHTENBERG: Thank you.
6	DIRECTOR SALLO: So, the framework is
7	there. It's just getting it ramped up so that we can
8	ultimately do the test run.
9	In Goal E, as it applies to our
10	financial and operational controls, we currently
11	have an ongoing audit. It's safe to say that nothing
12	has been flagged thus far, so that's I'm very
13	proud of staff for working so diligently on this
14	issue. We're undergoing a FISMA audit, as well, so
15	everything there is in compliance.
16	I've been in conversations with the IG
17	and giving them updates because that was one of the
18	goals in the IG report, is that we came into
19	compliance with FISMA. So, I'm happy to report that
20	we're moving along.
21	As it applies to our Human Capital Plan,
22	Tina identified someone that could come in to work
23	with us whom I am very impressed with, who will be
24	working with us in order to make sure that we align
25	our Human Capital Plan with our Strategic Action
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1	Plan, with the ultimate goal to make sure as we move
2	forward into the next fiscal year that our
3	performance appraisals that we're using comport with
4	not only the Human Capital Plan, but the Strategic
5	Action Plan, and are truly delivering a very
6	specific perspective on each employee's goals and
7	objectives while they're here in the Commission.
8	It is important as we move forward to
9	evaluate the employees and make sure that the
10	performance plan that is being implemented truly
11	captures what their duties are on their job, so we
12	are working very closely to modify that, along with
13	the AIs. I have set a time line for all employees in
14	the sense that they are everyone has reviewed
15	the AIs, we have now flagged them to see what needs
16	revisions and what needs to be tweaked, and now
17	we're going to start our working groups to make sure
18	as we move forward that all of that can be taken
19	care of.
20	In addition to what I've just described,
21	I told you about the training. Online training will
22	also be expanded, so as you know we also we
23	always have to do our ethics training. Our SAC
24	members are required to do ethics training. We now
25	have online ethics training for all of our SAC
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1	members, so as soon as they are appointed they do
2	the training, and then they can print out their
3	Certificate of Completion. And I have to thank
4	Jennifer Hepler for that. We're ongoing in Office of
5	Government Ethics audit right now, and they brought
6	to my attention that they were very happy that she
7	was able to implement this online training.
8	Apparently, this was requested from a long time ago,
9	but Jennifer came in and she was able to get it done
10	in a very short period of time, so I have to thank
11	her for that.
12	And, finally, Strategic Goal F, which is
13	to increase participation of our SACs. As you know,
14	I did have the opportunity before the furlough to
15	visit not only our Rocky Mountain office, but our
16	Western Regional office. I have had the pleasure
17	since then to have continuing conversations with SAC
18	Chairs. The Regional Directors have been very
19	helpful in putting together conference calls with
20	all the SAC Chairs within their region. They have
21	been very productive.
22	I have also participated in SAC
23	Committee meetings telephonically, and the goal is
24	to establish bimonthly SAC Chair conference calls
25	with the Staff Director and all the SAC Chairs so

The 2 feedback that I'm getting from all the one SAC feel disconnected 3 members is that they to the 4 Commission, so my goal is to not only raise 5 awareness through an exchange of information between the Commission and the SAC members, but also between 6 7 the SAC members themselves. that said, 8 So, our website is being 9 updated and a new page will be added that is specifically for our SACs. And on that page we will 10 11 announce any reports that are being released by the 12 SACs, any appointments by the uploading of press releases, and SAC members will also be able to go on 13 14 there and access any information on financial 15 disclosure rules with a link to the website, or any government ethics rules with a link to the OGE 16 17 website. In addition, we're setting up emails for 18 19 them that they can have exchange of SO an information through a LISTSERV. We're doing e-blast 20 21 so that they're aware of what other SACs are doing, 22 and what the Commission as a whole is doing. There 23 is a proposal by some of our Regional Directors to 24 establish a newsletter and they're going to draft

it, and they're going to be sending it out to make

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1	sure that there's communication between the
2	different regions, and the different SAC members.
3	And I believe that is about it as it applies to the
4	updates from the Staff Director's office.
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Is that all? What do
6	you do with your time? I want to thank you, Madam
7	Staff Director for, first of all, the report that
8	tracks our Strategic Plan. I can't tell you how many
9	organizations I'm a part of that will do a Strategic
10	Plan and then it sits on a shelf and no one ever
11	monitors whether we're hitting the guideposts. And
12	I'm really, really pleased to see that you're doing
13	that on top of the substantive efforts that are
14	occurring to make sure that that happens. So, I want
15	to thank you and the staff that are making that
16	occur, and I'm really pleased that you're acting on
17	many issues that we've been wanting to do for a long
18	time, whether it's SAC engagement, whether it's
19	access to the LEP community. So, bravo, appreciate
20	it.
21	DIRECTOR SALLO: Thank you. But I
22	couldn't do it without the staff.
23	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Absolutely. Any
24	questions for the Staff Director on what she just
25	provided to us?
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1	VI. ADJOURN MEETING
2	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Hearing none, then I
3	am happy to entertain a motion to adjourn.
4	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: So moved.
5	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Is there a second?
б	COMMISSIONER KLADNEY: Second.

17	December 16th.
18	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Can you share a name?
19	DIRECTOR SALLO: Oh, sure. His name is
20	Rory Smith, and he is he comes to us from the
21	Courts Services and Offender Supervision Agency of
22	the Office of the General Counsel. He has served
23	there as both Deputy General Counsel, as well as
24	Acting General Counsel. He has a Bachelor's in
25	Business Administration. He has a JD, and he an LLM
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1	in Law and Government with a Constitutional and
2	Civil Rights Admin Law and Regulatory Practice
3	certificates from American University.
4	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Great. Well, thank you.
5	Welcome news.
6	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: With that
7	announcement, I'd like to review our AIs, and I'd
8	like the Staff Director to do so, as well. If I
9	remember correctly, and I think it's whether it's
10	our AI or CFR, might even be a CFR, that the
11	Commission has either 30 days to reject the General
12	Counsel's appointment, or that we need approval. I
13	think it may be a rejection right, but I think there
14	should be a formal submission if either of those is
15	true.
16	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: I believe that that was
17	when the General Counsel was a Presidential
18	appointee.
19	DIRECTOR SALLO: Yes, this is a General
20	
21	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: This is a career
22	appointment now, so that is something that is not in
23	the purview of the Commission.
24	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay.
25	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Yes.
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2	So, that makes sense, but I'd like at least, if it
3	is a career appointment
4	DIRECTOR SALLO: It is. It's a career. It
5	went through the process as a it's a GS position.
6	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay. If I have a
7	further question upon research, I'll submit it.
8	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Call the new General
9	Counsel.
10	(Laughter.)
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And you have one
12	month to do it.
13	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: All right. Well, now we
14	have a motion to adjourn pending. All those in favor
15	say aye.
16	(Chorus of ayes.)
17	CHAIRMAN CASTRO: Aye. It is now
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Farewell, Abby.
