## Mississippi Advisory Committee to the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights Announces Study:

Civil Rights and Qualified Immunity of Law Enforcement in Mississippi

The Mississippi Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will convene a series of public meetings to discuss the impact of qualified immunity on police accountability and the equal protection of civilians in the administration of justice. The Committee will consider the potential impact of qualified immunity on disparities based on race, color, sex, national origin, religion, and/or disability status that exist throughout the criminal justice system. The Committee will also seek testimony regarding alternative or remedial policies and practice with the potential to address identified concerns.

The Committee will hear testimony from community members, families, advocates, law enforcement, and government officials. Members of the public will be invited to speak during an open comment period near the end of each meeting. The Committee will also accept written testimony submitted to <a href="mailto:mwojnaroski@usccr.gov">mwojnaroski@usccr.gov</a> by Sunday March 14, 2021.
