Police Oversight and Accountability in Virginia

The Virginia Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will continue its series of public meetings to discuss police oversight and accountability in the state, and its impact on the equal protection of civilians in the administration of justice. In this study, the Committee is examining the impact of law enforcement accountability on disparities based on race, color, sex, national origin, religion, and/or disability status that exist throughout the criminal justice system. The Committee is also seeking testimony regarding alternative or remedial policies and practice with the potential to address identified areas of concern.

The Committee will hear testimony from community members, families, advocates, law enforcement, and government officials. Members of the public are invited to speak during an open comment period near the end of each meeting. The Committee's first two panel discussions took place on July 16, 2021 and August 18, 2021, respectively. Committee Chair K. Shiek Pal said, "For the past several years, questions about police oversight and accountability - particularly in the context of communities of color -have played a pivotal role in our national dialogue about peace, equity, and justice. But the long history of the intersections between law enforcement and civil rights extends much further back in our nation's story, and implicates fundamental questions of accountability, training, recruitment, and representation. This is

a critical and timely topic for us to examine, with ramifications across this diverse Commonwealth, and I am eager to tackle this important work."

The Virginia Committee will issue findings and recommendations in a report to the Commission after all testimony has been received.
