Chair Gwendolyn Kircher said: "In 1924, Native Americans were given the right to vote. Montana has twelve tribal nations and seven reservations comprising 6.7% of our total population of one million. There have been many obstacles for them since given the right to vote including lack of voting locations, tribal IDs not being accepted as legal forms of identification, as well as issues with registering to vote because of address requirements. Currently, only 66% of Montana's Native American population are registered to vote and the Committee feels the disparities in voting rights need to be explored and hopefully rectified."

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The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, established by the Civil Rights Act of 1957, is the only independent, bipartisan agency charged with advising the President and Congress on civil rights and reporting annually on federal civil rights enforcement.
