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**Arkansas Advisory Committee to the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights Announces Public Hearings:**

*IDEA Compliance and Implementation in Arkansas Schools*

The Arkansas Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights is continuing its ongoing study of IDEA Compliance and Implementation in Arkansas Schools. The Committee seeks to better understand the extent to which students with disabilities are receiving the services to which they are entitled under relevant law and how the achievement of students with disabilities compares to the achievement of their non-disabled peers. The Committee is also reviewing the extent to which the provision of services to students with disabilities in Arkansas schools has resulted in disparities in both access to educational accommodations and their effectiveness based on race, color, sex, national origin, or religion.
