

U.S. Commission on Civil Rights Votes to Advance Investigation into Campus Antisemitism

Washington, D.C. — At its July 18th business meeting, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights voted to approve planning documents for its Fiscal Year 2026 Statutory Enforcement Report, *The Federal Response to the Rise in Antisemitism on American College and University Campuses*. The investigation, led on a bipartisan basis by Commissioners <u>Peter Kirsanow (R)</u> and <u>Mondaire Jones (D)</u>, will examine how the federal government responded to civil rights violations pertaining to Title VI, specifically allegations of antisemitism on college campuses.

This vote advances the Commission's <u>unanimous decision in January 2025</u> to undertake the investigation. The effort follows a <u>bipartisan request from over two dozen Members</u> <u>of Congress</u>, led by Representatives Jake Auchincloss (D-MA), Kevin Kiley (R-CA), and Debbie Wasserman Schultz (D-FL).

The investigation is set to begin in November 2025 with a public briefing at the Commission's Washington, D.C. headquarters and will culminate in a final report by the end of Fiscal Year 2026.
