State advisory committee members conduct reviews and produce reports and recommendations concerning local civil rights issues, including justice, voting, discrimination, housing and education. Congress mandates that the federal Commission establish advisory committees in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Appointees to State Advisory Committees serve two-year terms.

"I am proud of the work of this advisory committee, which has positively impacted state policies and practices. I look forward to continuing this work." Chair Diane Snelling said.

Past Vermont State Advisory Committee reports addressed racial harassment in public school, racial profiling, and disparities in the justice system. The committee will meet for the first time in July to consider its plans and priorities.
