

In the Name of Hate: Examining the Federal Government's Role in Responding to Hate Crimes

May 11, 2018 Washington, DC

On Friday, May 11, in Washington, DC, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will hold a public briefing on hate crimes and bias-related incidents. The Commission will <u>examine</u> best practices for local law enforcement on collecting and reporting data and the role of the Education and Justice Departments in prosecution and prevention of these heinous acts. <u>Commissioners</u> will hear from local law enforcement and federal government officials, experts, academics, advocates, and survivors of hate. We will also offer an open comment period in which members of the public will have the opportunity to address the Commission. The Commission has long condemned hate crimes, most recently through the Commission majority, <u>pointing</u> out that "hate incidents run counter to the values of inclusion and full participation Americans champion."
