Ohio Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights Announces Community Forum: *Education Funding*

On April 16, 2019, in Columbus, the Ohio Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will host a community forum to gather public testimony on the civil rights impact of education funding allocations in the state. The Committee is conducting this study to examine (a) the extent to which the state's school funding formula may contribute to a disparate impact on educational access and outcomes on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, and/or disability status; (b) if these policies and practices are reasonably necessary to the education success of the students or other aspects of the education system; and (c) alternative policies and practices with the demonstrated potential to address such concerns.
