Arkansas Advisory Committee to the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights Announces Community Forum: *Mass Incarceration*

On April 23, 2019, in Little Rock, the Arkansas Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will host a community forum to gather public testimony on the civil rights impacts of mass incarceration in the state. The Committee is conducting this study to examine incarceration rates in the State; particularly where these rates raise concerns regarding disparate impact on the basis of race, color, disability status, national origin, and/or sex.

The meeting will take place on April 23, from 1:00 pm to 3:30 pm CDT, at the University of Arkansas School of Law's E.J. Ball Courtroom, 1045 W. Maple Avenue, Fayetteville, AR 72701.
